


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Introduction

It has also been widely used in congregations to develop HIV-sensitive liturgies and sermons. Over the last forty one years of the military occupation of Palestinian land, Israel has implemented a policy of movement restrictions including checkpoints, earth mounds, trenches, gates, roadblocks, bypass roads, the Wall, and a complex system of permits. Restrictions on the freedom of movement of Palestinians have seriously affected their access to medical care, including emergency medical treatment. The ability to reach medical care and healthcare is very uncertain and depends on a number of arbitrary decisions and restrictions. Soldiers at checkpoints consistently stop ambulances and patients. The Palestinian Red Crescent Society has reported 112 deaths and 35 stillbirths as a result of preventing medical personnel and patients from crossing checkpoints. Come to get informed and to talk about this critical issue with Dr Muna Mushahwar, co-chairperson of the Palestine Israel Ecumenical Forum (PIEF) and a practicing physician in an Israeli Hospital in Jerusalem.

Every year, when over a million children return to school in Palestine occupied territories, an unacceptable number of them face long and precarious journeys to schools ill-equipped to receive them. Over 10,000 children start their school year in tents, caravans, or tin shacks and at least one third of government schools in these areas have poor and inadequate water and sanitation facilities. More than 226,000 children and over 9,300 teachers are unable to reach their regular classrooms and at least 580 schools have been closed due to Israeli military curfews, closures and home confinement. UNICEF has said Israel has an obligation to ensure education is accessible to every Palestinian child, in accordance with the 4th Geneva Convention and the Convention on the Rights of the Child. Come to get informed and to talk about this critical issue with Mr Adli Daana, UNICEF Learning for Development Officer.

Statelessness and the Impact on Women

Description of the side event:

Stateless women are often subjected to employment inequities, sexual assault, lack of adequate healthcare and struggle to care for their children in the country where they migrated seeking a better life. This side event will look at the global issue of statelessness and the impact on the most vulnerable and silent majority: women and children. Participants will get an overview of the history, causes and effect of statelessness among immigrant women and children from three perspectives: Bangladesh, Myanmar and North America/Caribbean/Mexico and discuss practical steps that can be taken as people of faith to create a more just society for the least among us.

Arbitrary Use of Violence against Palestinian Children

The report by its 18 independent experts acknowledged Israel's national security concerns and noted that children on both sides of the conflict continue to be killed and wounded, but that more casualties are Palestinian. Most Palestinian children arrested are accused of throwing stones, which can carry a penalty of up to 20 years in prison. During the past 10 years, an estimated 7,000 Palestinian children aged 12 to 17, but some as young as nine, had been arrested, interrogated and detained.
